JUNE DEMOS

We will have a very special double feature for the first meeting of June. On June 7, we will have a presentation on *Automated Watering Systems* by myself and another on *Black Pine Decandling* by Candace and Chris.

I will be going over some of the may different kinds of automated watering systems, the pros and cons of each, and some sage advice that I have gathered from many years of using the various systems.

The black pine demonstration is just in time for decandling season. This starts in June and typically goes until about the end of July. This is a great opportunity for those of you who have black pines as you can work on them for the 3rd Tuesday open workshops.

BEGINNER'S WORKSHOP

In July, we will have a beginner's workshop. This is a wonderful opportunity for our newer members to get their hands dirty with learning some bonsai basics. In small groups, we will be showing you the basics of

bonsai such as pruning, styling, wiring, and care. Other major techniques of bonsai will be introduced.

RECAP: JAY'S SHOW PREP DEMO

It felt like old home week at our May 17 meeting. Many long-time and new members came to see a top notch presentation by the ever-entertaining, talented, senior club member Jay McDonald. What had been planned to be a show-prep presentation was quickly turned into a mini show of fabulous bonsai from Jay's collection when it was announced that Marin Bonsai Club has pulled out of the Marin County Fair this year due to security and logistics concerns.

Jay artfully pivoted to discussing each of the trees showcased, noting their origin—sometimes humble—and his development and care techniques which transformed them into the magnificent specimens they are today.

There was time for a bit of show-and-tell of member trees which proved educational too as Jay and other members commented. Keep reading for some of the highlights of the presentation.

JAPANESE BLACK PINE

First up was a **Japanese Black Pine**, the *King of Bonsai*. Jay quoted several of his teachers as saying "If you don't have a JBP in your collection you aren't doing bonsai." The variety Jay presented looked a little different from the typical JBP because of its cork bark.

He demonstrated the decandling process which he was doing early in the season because the cork barked trees grow more slowly that the typical JBP and would need more time in the summer growing season to put out new buds. For the usual variety June and early July are the months for decandling, but, as Jay would mention often during the presentation, don't do anything strictly by the calendar or because some teacher told you to do it. Look at your trees, determine their health and condition of soil, size of candles and other factors before doing any work on your tree. The reason for decandling is to develop needles of the same size on the tree and develop ramification.

Jay also emphasized the importance of wiring on JBP. The branches just will not be in the right places without wire. Copper is used on conifers because it will hold the branches in place better than aluminum and looks nicer. Wiring can be done right after decandling so as not to disturb new buds that will be coming in during the summer and fall.

Needle plucking and reduction of new buds is done around November and fertilizing throughout the year is recommended for the best results.

REDWOODS

Moving on to the **redwood trees** Jay again emphasized the importance of wiring. He wires almost all branches on a tree when he begins styling so they can be used to fill in blank areas and create the serene look we associate with redwoods.

The larger of the two trees Jay has worked on for many years and he revealed the trick he used to create a tapered apex where they had been just a flat cut. It helps to be a finish carpenter to execute some of these techniques, but the results are spectacular.

Jay also discussed a tree he works on for member Peter Miller and demonstrated how the length and direction of branches can be controlled with aggressive pinching in the growing season. When doing this it is important to keep the shape of the tree you want to create in mind and leave the lower branches longer than the top. Don't be in a hurry, stop and step back to check your work frequently. Don't be on auto-pilot with any work you do on bonsai.

BLUE ATLAS SPRUCE

The **Blue Atlas Spruce** Jay brought we mostly just admired. Good specimens are difficult to find and Jay was delighted to bring this tree into his collection, admiring it for the soothing blue color, large trunk and magnificent branch development.

Again, wiring is key to having a tree look the way you want it to. It will take spruces longer for the branches to set and it might require 3 wirings over 5-6 years to get it just right. Maintenance is easy with just frequent plucking of old and long needles behind the smaller needle bundles, but beware, BACs don't bud back, so do everything possible to preserve the buds closer to the trunk.

LIQUIDAMBAR FOREST

The **Liquidambar forest planting** was in need of defoliating which led to a general discussion about when to do it and which trees will tolerate it. Many members have been in the practice of defoliating their deciduous trees a few weeks before the Marin

County Fair in order for the leaves to look proportional to the tree, which is the main point of defoliation.

For a look at this lush forest in winter silhouette check out this video Eric Schrader created of Jay in his bonsai garden paradise.

SATSUKI AZALEA

The **Satsuki Azalea** presented had been sick the year before and Jay discussed what he did to bring it back to health. While it had many beautifully colored flowers on it they were not regularly spaced and there were a few open areas that caused the tree to look out of balance.

Jay has been feeding the tree consistently with Miracle-Gro and told us he would take all the flowers and buds off the tree the next day to preserve the strength of the tree, developing stronger branches which could later be styled to bring the tree back to its full beauty.

He also mentioned the danger of watering azaleas too much. They like to be moist, but not wet and he is using yamagoki moss as a top layer on his azaleas to keep moisture in without the need for watering so much. (Gorgeous satsuki azaleas were on display at the Bay Area Satsuki Aikokai show in Oakland, May 21-22 at the Garden Center at Lake Merritt.)

UME

Jay's **Ume** (Japanese Apricot) is often the hit of the winter BABA show because it is filled with flowers on its graceful silhouette, but we saw it with small apricots replacing the flowers and it was full of them.

Jay noted the necessity of reducing the number of fruit so as not to deplete strength from the branch development, and because the weight of too much fruit can break branches. His recommendation for making successful fruiting/flowering bonsai is feed-feed-feed!

CALIFORNIA JUNIPER

One of Jay's favorite trees is his **California juniper** which he bought for a song because the collector didn't see much potential in it. Jay completely changed the orientation of the tree to be upright instead of horizontal and has worked on the deadwood areas consistently to create the contrast between live and deadwood.

A California juniper as light and delicate as this one is unusual and Jay continues to bring out the best of this tree with his vision and artistry—planning for another subtle change in position in the pot at repotting time adding to the grace and elegance of his tree.

SHOW AND TELL

We also had time for show-and-tell with members' trees which proved instructional.

Two pyracanthas were shown, one by Candace which has been developed over 6-7 years and needed only a light haircut to have been ready for the Fair, and Diane's newly rescued tree which needs new soil and removal of the berries to direct strength back to the branches so she can have the fun of working on it in another year or so.

Chris showed his honeysuckle which is always a hit at the Fair because of the sensuous shape of the truck and lovely, fragrant flowers. People are amazed that a vine can be made into a bonsai and proves the point that some wonderful material can be found in urban collecting. (Be sure to get permission before you dig.) The hit of the show-and-tell session was Susan's juniper which she got at the Beginning Bonsai workshop in 2018. It has grown well and looks healthy, ready for a haircut and some wiring. We don't often see beginning bonsai trees do so well in the hands of beginners, but Susan showed she has the chops to make beautiful bonsai.

It was a great meeting and we want to thank Jay for making the effort to bring so many beautiful trees to impress and enlighten us, and members for bringing their trees to discuss. It was a great learning experience for all.


